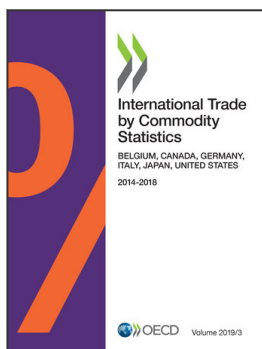
### Reporting and partner countries
